## CONCEPTUAL FRAMEWORK

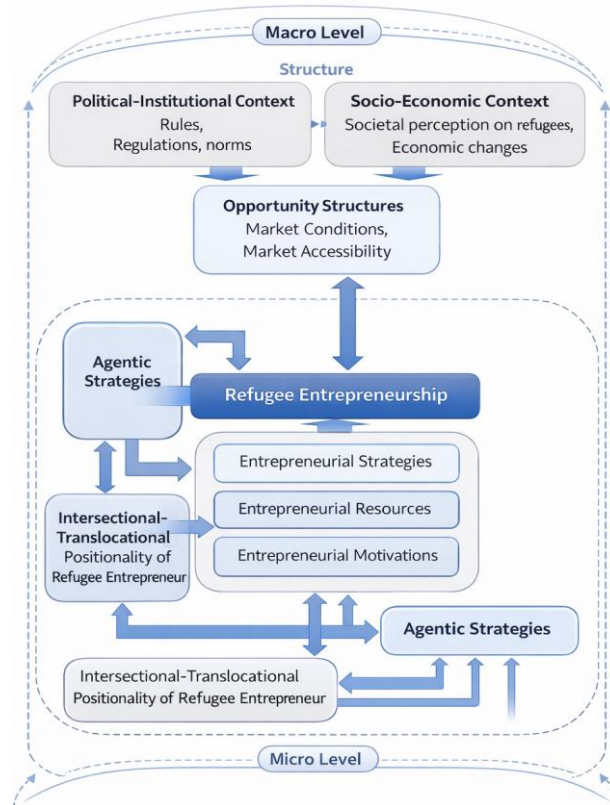


Figure 1: [https://www.researchgate.net/figure/A-conceptual-model-for-studying-refugee-entrepreneurship\\_fig1\\_377340412](https://www.researchgate.net/figure/A-conceptual-model-for-studying-refugee-entrepreneurship_fig1_377340412)<sup>vii</sup>
